Message from the Executive Director Season's Greetings!



It has been an interesting, exciting and busy year since our last Newsletter in March 2008.

In response to the numerous plant closures and lay-offs in our tri-county region, we have been involved in a pilot project with Literacy Link South Central and the western region literacy networks (Learning Networks of Ontario – Southwest) aimed at assessing laid-off workers. Through this project we have offered and provided educational interviews at the Inergy Action Centre in Blenheim, Community Transitions Project in Wallaceburg and the Plastech Action Centre in Leamington. These educational interviews have assisted people by providing them with information on further education and training options related to their needs and goals. Feedback from the participants has been very positive.

As far as professional development, in the spring we organized and hosted Getting Connected III in Windsor and Sarnia. The workshop was for Employment Ontario staff including Literacy & Basic Skills, Job Connect, Apprenticeship, Employment Assistance Services as well as Employment Benefits and Support Measures staff. This was a great opportunity for networking and information sharing with 62 Windsor-Essex Employment Ontario representatives at the workshop in Windsor on June 13, 2008 and 59 Chatham-Kent and Sarnia-Lambton Employment Ontario representatives in Sarnia on June 6, 2008. Thanks to Sandra Hennessey and the Literacy & Basic Skills programs in the tri-county region for all your hard work in making this a success!

In the fall we hosted "Through Worker's Eyes – Developing Authentic Workplace Learning Activities" and "The 3 R's of Research". Thanks to QUILL, LiNDR and presenter Cindy Davidson, for making this possible!

We are working in partnership with Sarnia Lambton Workforce Development Board on an employer breakfast on essential skills for the winter in Sarnia-Lambton. We also hope to learn more about possible new projects for 2009 for Windsor-Essex.

The newsletter provides an update of some of our public awareness activities and learner success stories in the region plus an update on new resources available for borrowing from our library.

Tri-County Literacy Network Literacy Promotion Award Recipient for Sarnia-Lambton for 2008

This year, in Sarnia-Lambton, we would like to recognize the contributions of **Ray Ferguson**.

Ray Ferguson's love of learning has been lifelong. Retired, several years ago, he decided to lend his skills and his knowledge when he volunteered to assist with the LBS program at Lambton College. His time there was put to good use as he saw many adult learners go on to achieve their academic goals.

More recently, Ray decided to return to school to take a computer course. He discovered that he was only 4 credits short of achieving his own goal of obtaining his high school diploma. Since it had been a few years since he had done English, he decided to upgrade his skills in the Literacy and Basic Skills program. Soon Ray was excelling in his courses and to use his own words, he "never realized that learning could be so enjoyable." Much to the delight of his family and his teachers, at the age of 76, Ray Ferguson received his high school diploma at a graduation ceremony on May 28, 2008. His accomplishments have inspired all of those who know him.

Ray's love of learning has affected almost everyone who knows him. His contributions to the Literacy and Basic Skills program were significant. Ray leads by example. His own accomplishments are proof of this. The local newspaper was so taken by his story that they wanted to interview him for a feature story they were doing on the most recent graduation. When Ray realized that his story would inspire others to come forth, he agreed to be interviewed. His story appeared in the local newspaper and upon reading it, a local A Channel news reporter was so taken by it that she wanted to also meet with Ray to discuss his accomplishments for a television report. Modest about all the publicity he was receiving, Ray agreed to do the television piece because he wanted to promote the program to others in the community. Since completing his program with the Lambton Kent District School Board, Ray will continue his lifelong learning journey by taking university courses in the future. We are sure he will continue to inspire anyone who has the privilege of crossing his path.

Tri-County Literacy Network Literacy Promotion Award Recipient for Windsor-Essex for 2008

This year, in Sarnia-Lambton, we would like to recognize the contributions of **Nancy Friesen**.

Nancy's primary education was mostly in Mennonite schools in Mexico. As an adult, married and with 2 children, she decided to go back to school and work on her GED. She was successful in completing this through the Invest Centre in Leamington (Greater Essex County District School Board), and the same month was hired by South Essex Community Council to be the Program Leader for the ImPACT (Immigrant Parent and Child Training) program. Being in on the ground floor of program development was quite a challenge, but Nancy rose to the occasion and proved to be instrumental in inspiring other women from her cultural background. The literacy program for low-German speaking mothers and their children was, and still is, very successful.

Nancy's efforts have empowered at least 50 women per year to attend classes, learning reading, writing and life skills. Their children have been impacted by being in a learning readiness environment preparing them for the Canadian school system.

Nancy has moved on to a new position as a Settlement worker in schools in Leamington. She is still able to assist the same population group and continues to refer them to literacy programs, as well as to other services in our community.

Mary Lou Dickinson grew up in northern Quebec. After attending university in Montreal, she moved to Michigan. Then she settled in Toronto where she has lived ever since. She worked for many years as a crisis counselor. Her fiction has been published in the University of Windsor Review, Descant, Waves, Grain, Northern Journey, Impulse, Writ, The Fiddlehead, Canadian Woman Studies and broadcast on CBC Radio. Her first book, a collection of short stories, One Day It Happens, was published by Inanna Publications in May 2007.
