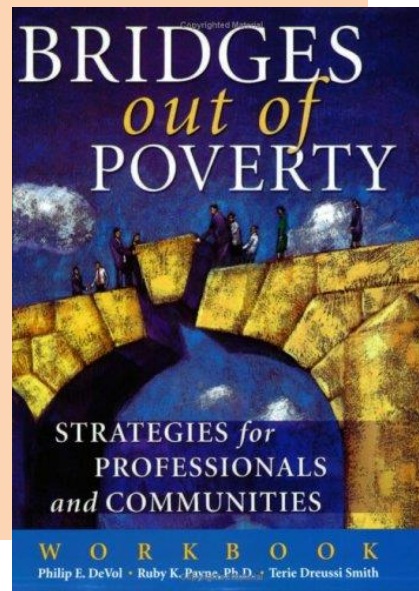

Adam Vasey – Biography

Adam received a B.A., LL.B., and M.S.W. from the University of Windsor, and a Master of Laws from Osgoode Hall Law School at York University. As Director of Pathway to Potential since 2009, Adam has been responsible for the development of a collaborative, multi-sector strategy for the prevention and reduction of poverty in Windsor-Essex County. This position, which draws on his training in law and social work, has allowed Adam to fulfil a long-time commitment to social justice. Through this work, he sits on numerous local, provincial and national poverty-related committees. He was appointed to the provincial Minimum Wage Advisory Panel, which presented its final report to the Ministry of Labour in January 2014. In 2013 Adam received the “Distinguished Social Worker of the Year” award through the Ontario Association of Social Workers – Southwestern Branch.

Linda Coltman- Biography

Linda is the co-chair of Pathway to Potential’s (P2P’s) Collaborative Leadership Team and a member of P2P’s Voices Against Poverty group as well as a person with lived experience to poverty and invisible disabilities.

Linda is a long-term kidney transplant recipient who experienced homeless and clinical depression while she was a teenager undergoing acute renal failure. After receiving stable housing in an affordable housing community and the aforementioned lifesaving organ transplant, Linda went on to experience over two decades of living in poverty/on ODSP income supports as a person with chronic disabilities.

Throughout this time however, Linda remained active as an advocate within the housing and health sectors and has extensive experience in working with a variety of stakeholder groups and organizations. She has also worked closely with political and social service groups to improve conditions for persons with disabilities, seniors, and low-income individuals and families.

As a person with lived experience to poverty and disability, Linda’s leadership example as an advocate centers around her belief that is essential for those with lived experience to marginalization to try to find the courage, dignity and hope to stand up and make their voices heard in order to be catalysts of change rather than victims of circumstances.

In addition to her association with Pathway to Potential, Linda is also a member at large of Voices From the Street (VFTS) speakers’ bureau and a former Steering Committee member of the 25in5 Network for Poverty Reduction and the Housing Network of Ontario and is a graduate of the Maytree Foundation’s Leaders For Change and School 4 Civics Leadership Programs and also a graduate/certified peer recovery educator of the Peer Recovery Education for Employment and Resilience (PREFER) program.
